Cris is co-chair of the Latina Giving Circle, a donor advised fund under the Texas Women's Foundation, which will provide grants to non-profits that focus on the needs of Latinas / Hispanic community.

Cris served as a board member of the Texas Diversity Council, and on the Dallas corporate advisory board of the Association of Latino Professionals in Finance and Accounting. She is a member of the National Charity League – Mansfield Chapter whose mission is to foster mother-daughter experiences in a philanthropic service and leadership. Closer to home, Cris has served as a passionate advocate for the North Central Texas Alzheimer's Association for the past 14 years. She has served on various committees and chaired the Arlington Memory Walk the past two years in honor of her mother.
